Would you like to share your church's story with hundreds of visitors this summer?

The Diocese of York is partnering with York Archaeological Trust and inviting churches to take part in the JORVIK Group's programme of medieval summer events in 2016. In 2015, twenty-six churches took part in Church Explorers, with some welcoming hundreds of visitors.

Church Explorers involves churches opening their buildings for open days on a medieval theme. In recent years, churches have included artworks by local children, exhibitions, talks and guided walks, archery, wood carving, wool spinning, and medieval banquets. Churches have built on relationships

with schools and local groups to create wonderful events, which have received coverage throughout the Yorkshire region via the Festival's website, social media and printed programmes.

Archbishop Sentamu's Pilgrimage of Prayer, Witness and Blessing



Archbishop Sentamu is now well underway on his six-month Pilgrimage of Prayer, Witness and Blessing across the Diocese of York. He begins his Pilgrimage in Whitby on Tuesday 1 December; he will later journey to the East Riding, and finish in York Minster on Trinity Sunday (22 May 2016).

Archbishop Sentamu is spending six days, from Tuesday to Sunday, in each of the Deaneries. He will be walking a sizeable distance each day from the coast, over moor and dale, along highways and byways, through both the rural and urban communities from the Humber to

the Tees and the A1 to the coast. His aim is to meet people, pray with them, and to encourage them to follow Christ, and bless what God is doing.

Archbishop Sentamu said, "My prayers have led me to this pilgrimage. St Paulinus, St Aidan, St Cuthbert and St Hilda of Whitby in their time shared the good news of Jesus Christ with the people of the North. Praying for those who come to know Christ is a great privilege and a joy. During this pilgrimage, I would like to encourage everyone I meet to commit themselves afresh to try praying, be open to encountering Jesus Christ, pray for a mighty outpouring of the Holy Spirit, and receive the gift of the joy provided by Jesus Christ – and be thankful. Pray with me, and join me on the road!"

Vocations stories

With Generous Churches very much in mind, a New Year for many pursuing a vocation to ordained ministry means an offering that takes them on a journey of discovery. Let me share a few stories:

There's Tom, a recent graduate from York University and former member of the Minster congregation. His New Year brings the prospect of marriage, a Selection Panel (Bishops' Advisory Panel) and, if all goes to plan, time at a college being formed for priestly orders in the future. At present Tom is undertaking a year pastoral assistant/intern which the diocese organised with a church next to the Borough Market in the heart of London. He's rubbing shoulders with the 'great' as well as those engaging with urban deprivation.

Abi is married and in her late 20s, holding down a significant role as a Health Care Assistant in a York hospital. Her New Year takes her in to the second term of training with the Yorkshire Ministry Course. Her sense of vocation is to the Permanent or Vocational Diaconate. – 'to the door of the church rather than to the Communion Table'. Abi has been a Street Angel (ministering to clubbers on the streets of York) as well as a Chaplain at the York Races.

John has also, but more recently, been selected for training as a Deacon. He's retired with three adult children. The New Year heralds a complete new focus of ministry in a group of the coastal churches of the diocese. Recently selected for training he begins studies

and formation later this year. His journey to ordination began many years ago as a lay man in the Methodist church. He has already held a significant role within the community during a recent parish vacancy but looks forward to wearing his 'dog-collar' as he serves in a different capacity alongside a new Incumbent.

There's Nick, a Consultant Psychiatrist, married with three young children. With a successful career to hand, Nick has very recently been selected as a potential Incumbent but has yet to trace out his training and what his future ministry will look like. It may, for instance, take the shape of Self Supporting ministry. In this, he embodies the sense that vocation for each one of us is a journey of discovery, of where God wants us to be his disciples and to become the people he wants us to be.

These are just a small sample of those who are responding to the generous love shown to us by God - some of the people I have the privilege to walk alongside as they ask themselves, 'where does God want me to serve?' Praise God that many more like these are responding to the call to be generous in their service of our Lord whether within ordained ministry or our baptised - and surely most important - calling and vocation to be followers and disciples of Jesus.

150 years of Readers

In 2016, the Church of England will be celebrating 150 years of Reader ministry.

The order of Readers was inaugurated on Ascension Day 1866 to extend the effectiveness of the traditional parochial system to new pioneering work on the boundaries between church and world.

There will be events to celebrate this anniversary across the Diocese, but the first chance to mark the 150 years of Readers is on Sunday 7th February: Reader Sunday.

Geoff and Susan Hill from Guisborough were among seven new Readers licensed by Archbishop Sentamu in November (pictured left).

Geoff said, “I began attending church regularly about 15 years ago in 2000, and my faith developed quickly. In 2011, our vicar asked me and my wife, Susan, if we had considered applying for Reader Ministry training. I dismissed it, thinking God wouldn’t call me. I could see so many other people in the Church with what I considered ‘better claims’ to such a calling, as after all I was a relative ‘newcomer to Christ’. The vicar encouraged me to consider this seriously, but it was not until the following year, after praying long and hard, discussing this with my wife and family, others in the Church, and others who I knew were



going through Reader Ministry training, that I decided that I would put myself forward, recognising that this was God’s decision, not mine.

Susan said, “Returning to study has been quite a challenge for me, every time we started a new module I would look at the essay titles and the deadlines and think to myself ‘I can’t possibly manage to do this! In time, though, I began to accept that if God really was calling me to Reader ministry then he would help me to meet the challenges of the course.

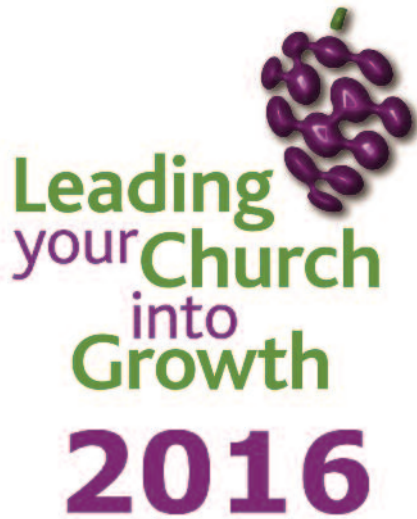
“Throughout our married life Geoff and I have always been supportive of each other. Our vocations in Reader ministry have always been distinct; we are, after all, different people, with different gifts to offer. However, I do feel that we complement each other, and that God, in his wisdom, has called us both.”

Leading Your Church Into Growth

After the success of this pilot conference, the second conference will have room for 80 benefices, from 19 to 22 September 2016 at the Hayes Centre, Swanwick. This conference will be led by Robin Gamble.

Benefice teams should be made up of the Incumbent and two lay people who will be part of the team putting into place what will be learned at the conference, and helping lead your church into growth.

All Saints Brandsby receives HLF funding

All Saints Brandsby has received a grant of £33,000 from the Lottery Heritage Fund towards the repair and reconstruction of its distinctive cupola, designed by the architect Thomas Atkinson and built by his mason Richard Scurr.

The restoration of the cupola has been undertaken by Crighton Conservation of Northallerton under the watchful eye of church architect Linda Lockett. The pupils of Crayke Church of England Primary School have taken a keen interest in the project and helped produce a time capsule which is now placed in the bell chamber below the cupola. The time capsule is sealed and with a note saying Not to Be Opened until November 2065, and it contains information about village and school life in 2015 along with recordings of a number of the pupils explaining what they hope to be doing 50 years from now.

Thomas Atkinson (1729 - 1795) was a distinguished architect with a practice at 20 St. Andrewgate in York, a house he himself built and which is still to be found there. Atkinson also designed the Bar Convent Chapel in York, remodelled the facade of Bishopthorpe Palace and is thought to have built Sutton Park, so he was no mean craftsman. Giles Scott, chairman of the Brandsby Cupola Committee said 'We're delighted that the Heritage Lottery Fund has given us this grant,

which has ensured the preservation of this historically important church both as a hub of community activity and religious services into the future'.

New York Course on the Psalms

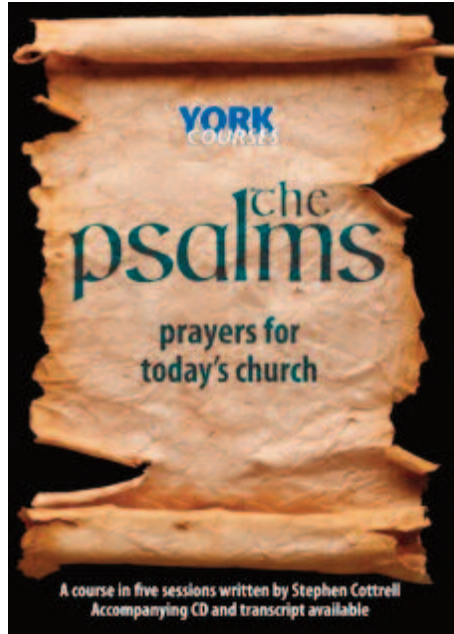
York Courses have produced a new course, ideal for Lent (or any other time) on the Psalms.

The ancient poems we call Psalms are over 2000 years old. But these songs have stood the test of time for they address many of the problems we still face: violence, injustice, anger - and bewilderment. Why do the wicked prosper? Where is God when we suffer? In this 5-session course, Bishop Stephen Cottrell - a prolific and popular author - reflects on the psalms in general (and five psalms in particular). He invites us to join him as he does so.

This is an easy-to-use ecumenical discussion course for groups comprising course booklet, CD and transcript, with a choice of wide-ranging questions to help group leaders involve all members in lively discussion.

Participants on the course CD include John Bell of the Iona Community; Fr Timothy Radcliffe OP, Director of the Las Casas Institute, Blackfriars, Oxford; the Revd Rose Hudson-Wilkin, Chaplain to the House of Commons, and the Revd Dr Jane Leach, Principal of Wesley House.

Holocaust Memorial Day

Every year on 27 January, the world marks Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD). Holocaust Memorial Day provides an opportunity for everyone to learn lessons from the Holocaust, Nazi persecution and subsequent genocides and apply them to the present day to create a safer, better future.

The theme for HMD 2016 is "Don't stand by". The Holocaust and subsequent genocides took place because the local populations allowed insidious persecution to take root. Whilst some actively supported or facilitated state policies of persecution, the vast majority stood by silently – at best, afraid to speak out; at worst, indifferent. Bystanders enabled the Holocaust, Nazi

Persecution and subsequent genocides.
