ALL YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT THE ADVENT WREATH



The Advent Wreath has four red or blue candles in a ring around a white or gold candle. Alternatively, there may be three purple candles, reflecting the liturgical colour for Advent, with a pink candle for the Third Sunday, when rose-pink vestments are traditionally worn. The first candle is lit on Advent Sunday; additional ones are lit, one on each Sunday, and the white or gold one on Christmas Day.

The new candle each week may appropriately be lit during the Prayers of Penitence. In this case the material entitled 'Prayers of Penitence at the Advent Wreath' is used. Alternatively, the candles may be lit after the Gospel Reading, before the Peace, or after Communion, where the prayer(s) used at the lighting becomes a natural Post-Communion prayer. All five candles may appropriately be alight during services through the Christmas season.

There are several traditions about the meaning or theme of each candle. The scheme that accords best with the Common Worship Principal Service Lectionary is:

Advent 1 The Patriarchs
Advent 2 The Prophets
Advent 3 John the Baptist
Advent 4 The Virgin Mary
Christmas Day The Christ

Each of the four Sundays then reminds us of those who prepared for the coming of Christ. 'The Patriarchs' can naturally focus on Abraham, our father in faith, and David, the ancestor in whose city Jesus was born. 'The Prophets' gives an opportunity to reflect on the way the birth of the Messiah was 'foretold'. John, who proclaimed the Saviour, and Mary, who bore him in her womb, complete the picture.

Almighty God, give us grace to cast away the works of darkness, and put on the armour of light, now in the time of this mortal life in which your Son Jesus Christ came to visit us in great humility; that in the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge both the living and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen*.

Bible Readings for Advent Sunday



Old Testament Reading: Isaiah 64:1-9

O that you would tear open the heavens and come down.

so that the mountains would quake at your presenceas when fire kindles brushwood

and the fire causes water to boil--

to make your name known to your adversaries, so that the nations might tremble at your presence!

When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect, you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence.

From ages past no one has heard, no ear has perceived,

no eye has seen any God besides you, who works for those who wait for him.

You meet those who gladly do right, those who remember you in your ways.

But you were angry, and we sinned; because you hid yourself we transgressed.

We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a filthy cloth.

We all fade like a leaf, and our iniquities, like the wind, take us away.

There is no one who calls on your name, or attempts to take hold of you:

for you have hidden your face from us, and have delivered us into the hand of our iniquity.

Yet, O LORD, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand.

Do not be exceedingly angry, O LORD, and do not remember iniquity forever.

The Epistle: 1 Corinthians 1:3-9

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind-- just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you-- so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

The Gospel: Mark 13:24-37

Jesus said, "In those days, after that suffering,

the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken.

Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in clouds' with great power and glory. Then he will send out the angels, and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven.

"From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

"But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch. Therefore, keep awake—for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake."

These readings are all from the New Revised Standard Version of the Bible. (NRSV)

A few words from our Archdeacon

The Venerable Dr. Amanda Bloor.

Archdeacon Amanda was to have was to have preached the sermon at Ormesby this Sunday Church, but of course, lockdown intervened. Instead she has kindly sent us the following reflection.

Counting the days



I always look forward to Advent, but this year I'm more excited than ever to be entering the season. After the strange year we've been living through and the uncertainties of lockdown, regional tiers and restrictions on worship, the thought of a defined period of time with a clear outcome – we will, no matter what or how, be celebrating the birth of Christ on December 25th – seems more attractive than ever.

But of course, Advent is much more than a countdown to Christmas Day. It's certainly more than calendars filled with chocolate or other consumables (did you know that it's possible to buy an Advent calendar containing a piece of diamond jewellery for each of the 24 days, a snip at a mere £100,000?). Advent helps us to rebalance our spiritual lives, to think about who we are, what we believe, what we need to change and what it is that we hope for. That's why in Christian tradition, Advent reflections have focussed on the four last things: death, hell, heaven and judgement. We rejoice in the birth of the baby who will save us all, but we remain in awe of him too.

The reading from Isaiah that's set for this first Sunday in Advent asks that God might 'tear open the heavens and come down'. Well, that's precisely what we're preparing for; the joy and the wonder of Jesus Christ, God amongst us. But as today's Collect reminds us, Jesus will come again 'to judge the living and the dead' so we need to be ready to meet him at that last day. Advent helps us to do that work as we reflect and pray. It's a good time and a necessary one.

The Bible reading today is from the book of Isaiah chapter 2 verses 1 -5

Isaiah writes:

"This is the message that I was given about Judah and Jerusalem:

In the future, the mountain with the Lord's temple will be the highest of all.

It will reach above the hills; every nation will rush to it.

Many people will come and say,

"Let's go to the mountain of the Lord God of Jacob and worship in his temple."

The Lord will teach us his Law from Jerusalem, and we will obey him. He will settle arguments between nations.

They will pound their sword and their spears into rakes and shovels they will never make war or attack one another.

People of Israel, let's live by the light of the Lord."

Isaiah was a prophet; he spoke of what he saw for Judah and Jerusalem. He saw a mountain which was taller than all others. At the top was the Lord's temple. All people from many different countries will come to it. The Lord will judge the nations and settle their disputes with one another. There will be no wars, weapons will be destroyed and soldiers will no longer be trained to fight.


He said, "Come descendants of Jacob, let us walk in the light of the Lord."


