

To the Saints of the Diocese of York

The Bishop of Beverley, Stephen Race, writes:

Recently I made my first ever visit to Portugal for a short holiday on the Algarve coast.

While there, my wife and I stumbled upon a music festival taking place on a nearby beach, and I was introduced to the music of the Swiss DJ and record producer Yves Lerock. I gather I'm about 20 years behind the curve with this and although his music may not be my first choice, there was something infectious about the enthusiasm of the crowd made of people of all ages – babes in arms to grandparents – dancing in the sand and having a wonderful evening in a very modern way.

Standing there, I couldn't help but notice the cliffs that formed the backdrop to the festival: the cliffs that are a striking feature of that coastline. A quick Google search told me that they are at least 25 million years old, made up of rock formed between 252 and 66 million years ago. What was fascinating about the rocks, apart from their breathtaking beauty, was the abundance of ancient shells contained within them, all slowly making their appearance after millennia hidden away.

While listening to 21st century music, I could touch something millions of years old.

We adhere to a faith that is a little over 2000 years old. In the grand scheme of things, that's nothing at all, and yet we believe and proclaim that the Jesus Moment in history is pivotal.

That suggestion is as mind-blowing as touching or holding a 25-million-year-old shell, or was it 252 million years old?

However, as Christians it is something we hold onto dearly and we must continue to hold onto it. Jesus may have been Incarnate for an incredibly brief moment in time, but all that he said, did and represented conveyed and conveys something that is eternal – present even before the most ancient landforms came into being and to be present long after they have disappeared. We belong to someone who is beyond our imagination.

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life." John 1 v 1-4.


Karen's role as Diocesan Ambassador is voluntary but integral to maintaining communications within the Diocese and looking for opportunities to promote the work of the Children's Society.

Heralds and Servants:

Archbishop to ordain ten new Deacons to serve in the Diocese of York

Ten women and men with varied stories of God's call to serve are due to be ordained Deacon by the Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell, in York Minster on Saturday 1st July. The preacher is the Revd Canon Dr Anderson Jeremiah, Bishop's Adviser For Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic Affairs in the Diocese of Blackburn.

Deacons are called to work in the community and assist in church: each candidate will serve as Assistant Curate in a parish within the Diocese of York, the Church of England between the Rivers Humber and Tees and between the A1 and the Yorkshire coast.

The ten are aged from 26 to 64, and will continue their training in service alongside an experienced priest; some will be ordained priest themselves in the future.

Archbishop Stephen said, "I've

loved hearing the different stories each of these candidates tells about the ways God is calling them - by surprise or over many years, through moments of joy or sometimes in the midst of great pain - and it's a privilege to share their excitement in answering that call.

"As deacons they will be heralds of the aospel and servants of those they meet and whose lives they touch; I'll be praying for them as they set off on these next steps in their journey, living Christ's story in the communities they are called to serve."

He grew up in church, but he says

that in October 2007 things changed for him: "Whilst receiving communion, I noticed the colours in the church grow brighter, and the pictures become sharper - and then I immediately knew that the God my parents had taught me about was my God."James had wanted to be a chemistry teacher growing up; while studying Chemistry at York God called him to be a priest. "Walking across the campus I almost

heard a voice call me, and the memories of people telling me they thought God was calling me to be a priest came back into my mind."

He has trained for ordination over three years at Cranmer Hall, Durham.

"I am going to work with the community in St Barnabas, Middlesbrough. I am looking forward to getting stuck in with all that is happening at the Church, youth work, student team and wider community."

Canterbury Cross for Canon Linda Ali



Canon Linda Ali, one of the lay Members of the Church of England's General Synod representing the Diocese of York, has received the Canterbury Cross for Services to the Church of

England from Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby.

Launched in 2016, the Lambeth Awards recognise contributions to community service, worship, evangelism, interfaith cooperation, ecumenism and education.

Linda's award is for her outstanding contribution to the cause of Racial Justice in society and in the Church of England over 25 years.

Born in Trinidad and Tobago in 1943, Linda came to Britain in 1961 to study beauty therapy/film & stage make up in London.

Despite experiencing racial discrimination, and not wishing to disappoint her parents, Canon Ali was determined to make a success of her life.

After a long career in Trade Mark management, between 1997 and 2001, she completed undergraduate and postgraduate degrees with a developing focus on Racial Justice, including an MA thesis titled 'West Indian Nurses working in the National Health Service 1950s-1960s'. This led to research with The National Archives to develop an online exhibition about people of colour in Britain since the Roman Empire.

As an active member of the Set All Free Executive, from 2005 to 2007, she helped prepare the national resources and events for the 2007 Bicentenary Commemoration of the Abolition of the Slave Trade Act.

She was also involved with the Centenary Commemorations of the WWI Armistice, in 2018, through the project 'They Also Served', honouring the contributions made by African and Caribbean service personnel in the Great War.

A General Synod Member since 2005, Linda was a member of the Committee for Minority Ethnic Anglican Concerns (CMEAC) between 2005 and 2015/6.

Concurrently, she was actively involved in 'Turning up the Volume', a project that aimed to increase the number of minority ethnic clergy in senior positions, and as the CMEAC Diocesan Link Person for the Diocese of York.

Linda Ali was elected to the Chapter of York Minster in 2021.

Most recently, she has been instrumental in establishing, with the Archbishop of York, the Diocese of York Racial Justice Task Group, including appointing the advocates who will progress this work with the next generation.

Julia is excited to serve a new community and looking forward to walking in faith alongside others.


